COVID-19 DYK

Who is at risk for severe illness from COVID-19?

According to the CDC, the risk of getting severely ill from COVID-19 increases with age and 8 out of 10 deaths from COVID-19 have occurred in people over the age of 65. In addition to age, the following underlying conditions will also cause adults of any age to be at increased risk of severe illness from COVID-19:

- Cancer
- Chronic kidney disease
- COPD
- Heart conditions
- Immunocompromised state from an organ transplant
- Obesity
- Pregnancy
- Sickle Cell Disease
- Smoking
- Type 2 diabetes

Children have been less affected by COVID-19, but underlying health conditions may cause them to have a severe illness from COVID-19.
